





# General presentation etiquette

- Only 300 people can attend a meeting at one time. If you expect larger numbers, find an alternative service such as Microsoft Teams Live.
- Disabled video if you don't need it.
- Stay muted when it's not your turn to speak.
- Set Q&A guidelines (e.g. questions to come at the end of the presentation, or via chat during the presentation).
- Ask attendees to put their hand up.




Setting up your presentation for success



#### Set your meeting roles

- The roles individuals have in a meeting determine the level of permissions they have
  - Organizer: refers to the person who creates the actual Teams meeting. The organizer has full meeting permissions and also has the ability to make additional users presenters or attendees. There can only be one meeting organizer, and this role cannot be changed.
  - **Presenter**: refers to people who have been designated to run the meeting by the meeting organizer. The presenter has the same meeting permissions as the organizer. There can be multiple presenters in each meeting.
  - Attendee: refers to people who are attending the meeting and are not the organizer or a presenter. The attendee has limited meeting permissions.




#### Set up a meeting lobby

- Aside from managing meeting roles, what is something else you can do to ensure that your meeting runs smoothly? Lobby settings!
- Teams offers a lobby where some or all meeting attendees will have to 'wait' before being admitted to the meeting.
- A lobby is especially useful when your meeting is large and/or contains a lot of confidential information.


## Pre-test your devices


- If you are uncertain about your audio and video configuration a good practice is to test it.
- You can do this by going to your settings in Teams and clicking Devices then Make a test call.

### Best Practices: Testing Audio and Video

- You can leave a voice message to test your audio.
- When the call is complete you will get a report on your microphone, speaker, camera and network settings.
- If an item is not connected, you can go to your Teams settings again to adjust.





## Turn your status to 'do not disturb'

- When you are presenting, your status will be set to 'do not disturb' by default.
- You can also turn it on manually.

## Tips and tricks for presenting

- Decide whether screen-sharing or a PowerPoint upload is best for you.
  - Screen-sharing: Lets you share your screen and easily navigate between windows and applications.
  - PowerPoint: Lets you upload a PowerPoint deck directly to Teams. Multiple people can present from the same deck.
- Share system audio when sharing an item with sound.
